In 2024-25, Asylum Welcome directly supported 2,087 people across Oxfordshire – offering advice, practical help, and hope to those seeking safety.

Against a backdrop of uncertainty, hardship and policy change, we continued to provide essential services: advice on navigating the asylum process; food for hungry families; laptops, bikes and bus passes; and emergency accommodation when there was nowhere else to go.



FATIMA'S STORY

Fatima is a young single mother staying at an asylum hotel with her seven-year-old son and elderly parents. Her son, who is autistic, struggled with the hotel-provided meals due to sensory sensitivities, which made mealtimes distressing.

To help manage his condition, their GP prescribed Omega-3 supplements - but these weren't covered by the NHS. Fatima couldn't afford them. and she worried about her son's health and her family's wellbeing.

709 people were supported by our Adult & **Family Service**

Recognising the urgency, our Outreach team enrolled her in our supplementary feeding programme. This enabled her to buy food

> her son could tolerate and access the vital supplements he needed.

673 people were supported through Hotel & Housing

The support offered relief, reassurance, and the feeling that she was not alone.

Our Schools Advocacy programme supported 23 families

LAYLA'S STORY

"My journey with Asylum Welcome started after a very dark period of my life."

Layla was homeless in Oxford, having survived the stillbirth of twins and an attack while sleeping rough. Referred by Crisis and supported by Asylum Welcome's immigration team, she was hosted through our Sanctuary Hosting service.

Layla was carefully matched with experienced female hosts outside Oxford. The move gave her a chance to recover physically and mentally. "My first host made me happy. Her house was big, warm and a perfect atmosphere; she made me feel like I was at home. Then I went to my next host, who was also very nice. She was very helpful and was there for me whenever I needed anything." The safety and care of her hosts gave Layla the strength to begin rebuilding.

Now recovering, she says, "Everyone who works with Asylum Welcome is amazing... people with big hearts doing an amazing job for everyone."

4,633 nights of accommodation were provided through **Sanctuary Hosting** for **49 guests** at risk of homelessness.

AYAAN'S STORY

Ayaan, 17, arrived in Oxford after a long and difficult journey from Syria. He had lost contact with his family and was placed in shared housing before being moved to a hotel. Isolated and anxious, Ayaan struggled to adjust.


Our Outreach team referred him to the Youth Service, where he was warmly welcomed at our Friday drop-in and youth club. Venda. At first, he barely spoke. Over time, with gentle encouragement, he began to join in - especially enjoying table football and cooking nights.

With our support, Ayaan received a bus pass and a refurbished laptop. He started attending college and joined our football project. He began to find structure and friendship again.

Today, he is confident, engaged, and excited about the future.

431 laptops were distributed through our programme

He hopes to continue studying English and one day become a translator - so he can help others the way he was helped.



HUSSEIN'S STORY

Hussein arrived in Oxford from Iran in 2024. He had fled after his relationship with another man was discovered - a risk that carried the threat of imprisonment or death under his country's laws.

He was placed in asylum accommodation, where being openly gay felt unsafe. But through our Hotel Outreach team, Hussein discovered Asylum Welcome's LGBTO+ peer support group, known as LOCS (LGBTQIA+ Oxfordshire Community Support).

At first, he was cautious – but the group offered a space where he could be himself. Over time, he became a core member and a supportive

figure for others. Since being granted refugee status, he has begun volunteering and building a new life

281 people received free bus passes and **255** people received **bikes** – reducing isolation and helping people reach school, medical appointments, volunteering, and vital community spaces.

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In 2024-25, we worked with 200 young people from all over the world.

After long and difficult journeys, these young people arrived alone in Oxford carrying hopes, ambitions, and the weight of everything they've survived. At Asylum Welcome's Venda youth club, they find friends, support and space to be themselves. Here's what that means to them.

3 El Salvador

Ali (age 18, from Syria)

"I make friends with different nationalities, improve my spoken English language, and have fun listening to music."

Ali came to the UK aged 16. after travelling through Syria and Jordan.



Ashraf (age 18, from Sudan)

"To me, Venda means a chance to develop my communication skills, meet like-minded individuals, and have fun with friends from diverse countries and backgrounds."

Ashraf fled Sudan and spent over a year travelling through Ethiopia, Libya, Italy and France before reaching the UK aged 16.

10 Afghanistan

Omran (age 18, from Syria)

"Venda has helped me meet new friends, have fun, and improve my English."

Omran's journey took him through Turkey, Greece, Bosnia, Italy, Germany and France. He arrived in the UK aged 17, after months on the move.

12 Vietnam
